Roald Dahl



Roald Dahl was born in Wales in 1916. When he was a boy, he loved reading books and listening to stories. His mother told him stories about trolls and other mythical creatures.

Roald Dahl started writing a secret diary when he was eight. He wrote in the diary every day and he hid it in an enormous conker tree in the garden.

Roald Dahl started boarding school when he was nine. He didn't like it. He was excellent at sports, but he wasn't very good at writing stories!

When he was 13, he started a new school. The school was near a chocolate factory. Roald loved chocolate, but he didn't like chocolate cake or chocolate ice cream.



He wrote his first children's book in 1943. It was called *The Gremlins*. Then, he started writing more books for adults. He didn't write another story for children until 1961, when he wrote *James and the Giant Peach*. He wrote *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* after that. Roald Dahl wrote over 20 books for children. He always wrote his stories in pencil on yellow paper. Roald Dahl's stories were very popular, but he only won a few prizes, including one for *The Witches* in 1983 and another for *Matilda* in 1988. His books are still very popular today. There are films of some of his books, too.



He once said, 'If you're going to get anywhere in life, you have to read a lot of books.'

BARACK OBAMA was born in Hawaii in 1961. He became the 44th President of the USA on 20th January 2009. His father was from Kenya and his mother was from Kansas in the USA. He lived with his grandparents when he was young. Barack Obama studied Law at university. He's very active and hard-working.

KAMEHAMEHA THE GREAT was the first king of Hawaii. Tradition says that he was born on a stormy night when a bright star appeared in the sky. He stopped the Hawaiian people fighting. In Hawaii, people celebrate King Kamehameha Day on 11th June. There's a parade with marching bands, horses and lots of flowers.

ELLISON ONIZUKA was born in Hawaii in 1946. He was the first NASA astronaut from Hawaii. He first went into space in 1985. He was very active and enjoyed running, fishing and outdoor sports. The Onizuka Centre for International Astronomy in Hawaii is named after him. You can use the telescopes at the centre to look at the stars.

BRUNO MARS was born in Hawaii in 1985. His real name is Peter Gene Hernandez. He was confident and independent when he was young and he loved music. Bruno writes songs, sings and plays the guitar, the piano and the drums. He has won lots of prizes for his music.

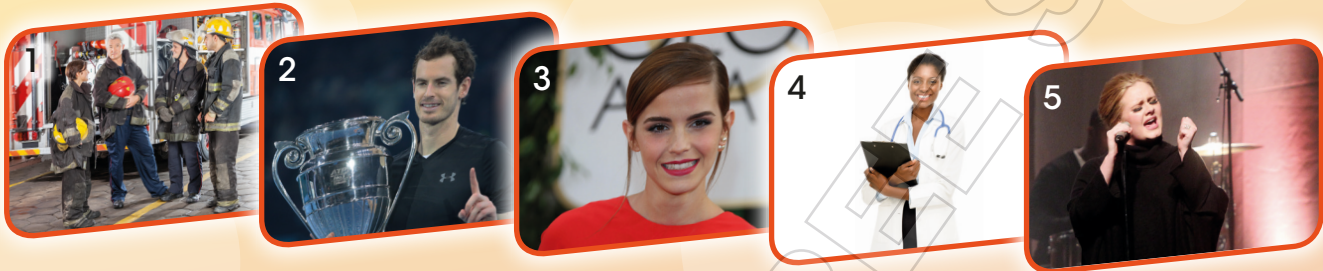
