Interviewer: Madeleine Pierce, an expert on royalty, an award-winning journalist is with us today. Madeleine, nice to finally have you in the studio. Can you tell us about your latest production. Rumour has it, it will see daylight next week. What's it going to be about? Is it connected with the 29th of April anniversary?

Madeleine: Only to some extent. With all the hype around Kate and William's anniversary I came up with the idea for a documentary about famous and infamous royal marriages of the mass media era. I didn't want to examine the intricacies of international affairs, since royal marriages have always involved not only royal members but principally embraced politics. Nowadays, we tend to forget that especially in the past, marriages served strategic reasons, primarily creating alliances. Occasionally, there was love in addition to these strategic considerations, but personal affection and romance were secondary to diplomatic and political reasons. I don't want to offer an in-depth analysis of those political factors as I'm not a historian, but rather draw a general picture. Going back to William and Kate, their nuptials as a spectacle had a diplomatic function too. Even though weddings are no longer political, we cannot say there was no element of strategy to the hype that surrounded their wedding. They were under a great amount of pressure because of celebrity culture and the fact that every detail of their lives could be and still is consumed for the enjoyment of the worldwide public.

Interviewer: Who else is going to be scrutinised in your programme? Prince Charles and Diana?

Madeleine: Well, their marriage of 1981 took a very important place in the annals of British historical lore. No wonder – it was the first wedding that reached enormously

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high viewing figures not only across the UK but also worldwide. It was by far one of the most memorable moments in the history of British Royalty. However, I also wanted to give an example of an infamous marriage in the royal family, that of King Edward VIII, who abdicated the throne in 1936 in order to marry the woman he loved — an American divorcée named Wallis Simpson. Apart from the famous and infamous, I also focused on couples which didn't evoke such excitement in crowds, but whose story to my mind is equally fascinating.

Interviewer: Such as?

Madeleine: Did you know that Prince Albert, future king George VI, proposed marriage to his future wife twice before she actually said yes? Not because she didn't love him, but because of her reluctance to accept the trappings of royal life in general. Poor Albert had to show a great deal of persistence. Another interesting fact concerns the wedding and marriage of Princess Margaret to Antony Armstrong-Jones. It will always be remembered best for the fact that it ended in divorce – for the first time since Henry VIII!

Interviewer: That's interesting. Can you spot any trends in the royal weddings?

Madeleine: If I were to make some generalisations, I'd say that regal marriages were assuredly not short on pomp and tradition, and we would expect nothing less from a royal family steeped in more than a thousand years of history, and despite the changing fashions, the formality of what is one of the most important state occasions has actually changed very little in the past century. Well, apart maybe from Prince Charles and Camilla Parker-Bowles' wedding ceremony, which was a truly familial and quiet event.
